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## Town Supervisor's News

A year ago in the winter edition, I dedicated almost my entire article to COVID-19. I promise to not repeat that, but I do want to mention a few important points. On October 7, 2021 Ontario County had 9,000 residents diagnosed with COVID-19 since the start of the pandemic. September was a very challenging month with an average of 30 positive cases per day. Multiple clusters were identified, including many here within our school district. Many families were impacted by classrooms being shut down for quarantine reasons. Our County government has weekly communications with every school district, and the feedback and input has been invaluable. VCS was the first County District to roll out the new PCR testing. This new testing option should change the protocol for sending our students home for days or weeks if they have any COVID symptoms. The testing allows positive cases to be caught quicker, meaning there's less risk of the virus spreading. Thank you District Parents for your support of this testing! Within this nine County Region we rank second with the most vaccinations. The County continues to offer the vaccine, and now the booster shot as well. Please check the County's website (<https://ontariocountyny.gov/101/Public-Health>) for these clinic dates and times. With the holidays coming up, let's keep taking the same precautions and safety measures that have been prescribed all along - social distance, avoid crowded environments, wear a mask, practice hand washing hygiene, and keep high-touch areas disinfected. I want to thank all of you for pulling together in the face of some very challenging times. This community has done a terrific job navigating through this ordeal.

### NEWSWORTHY ITEMS

To be sure, COVID tested out our mettle, and residents of this County should be proud to know that Ontario County is coming out on the other side of the crisis stronger, in the sense that it holds the distinction as one of N.Y. State's only 2 growing counties. Ontario and Saratoga are the only 2 counties experiencing growth in population and economies.

The 2020 census results saw a change in our own Town, with 11.1% population growth. On April 1, 2010 we stood at 14,275 residents, and April 1, 2020 our total was 15,860 residents, which is an increase of 1,585 new residents to our community. We are still the largest municipality in Ontario

County, with Farmington taking over the position as the fastest growing community.

The recently announced plans regarding the future relocation of Constellation Brands Global Headquarters was disappointing news. The pandemic and stay at home order of 2020 hit us with the loss of tax revenue generated from a company like Constellation. With little or NO employees reporting to work, purchasing breakfast, lunch, dinner, fuel or shopping around the Mall area, we had already felt the impact. I have spoken to the owner of this building-they will work with the Town to find a new tenant for this location. Outside of the loss of some sales tax revenue, there is no other financial impact on the Town.

A reminder to all residents there have been **A LOT** of stolen cars and car break-ins in Farmington and Victor over the last 30 days. **Please warn your neighbors...**lock your cars up, don't leave your car keys in the car, and call 911 for any suspicious activity. I have brought this up before, and I have had conversations with residents who have been victimized.

The Town was awarded \$1.2 Million dollars from (ARPA) the American Rescue Plan Act. The US Treasury identified four categories where this money can be used: the Town's response

to COVID -19 and the economic impact, premium pay to essential workers, restoration of lost revenue, and water/sewer/broadband infrastructure projects. Recovery Funds may be used for the provision of "government services" to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced during to the COVID-19 public health emergency. This means that the amount determined as "lost revenue" may be used for most regular government purposes, except for activities such as rainy day funds, reserve funds, debt service, and pensions. I do know that our County is looking to partner with all communities in an effort to expand broadband services everywhere. I promise to write more on how and where these Federal dollars will be spent.

The County Budget for 2022 was voted on at the Board of Supervisor's November 18th meeting. The proposed budget is to keep the tax rate flat at \$6.31 per thousand assessed value, which is the same tax rate as in 2021. The County is potentially exceeding the tax cap by \$1 Million dollars, and there are NO penalties associated with this action.

The Town's 2022 Budget includes the return of our Parks and Recreation Programs, continued road improvements throughout the Town, much needed IT

upgrades, and several staff additions to support our operations. Through the efforts of the Town Board, the Finance Department, and the thorough budgeting of all our Department Heads, even with all these additional expenses, the 2022 tax rate to our Victor residents will remain at \$1.74 per thousand assessed value, which is the same rate as this year. As part of the Town's Long Term Planning requirements, the Town Board, along with the Finance Department, will be meeting this year to discuss our Capital and Building needs for the future. Included in these discussions will be a plan for buildings and improvements for our Highway Dept., Town Court, and Parks and Recreation.

The Town Board and I are committed to providing the programs and services our residents expect, seeking alternative sources of revenues, and reducing spending where possible while maintaining a fiscally sound budget.

Many residents have seen the Humane Society around town to make sure dogs are registered and rabies are up to date. Yearly letters are mailed out to remind residents when their dog licenses are due. For your convenience, we do have the **Online Dog Portal** and many residents have been utilizing this to renew their dog license. This portal is for dogs who are already registered and need a renewal. Remember if you use this

### MARRIAGE LICENSES

Marriage Licenses are available in the Town Clerk's office. Any Town or City Clerk in New York State can issue marriage licenses for ceremonies in any location in New York State. Marriage licenses must be obtained at least 24 hours before the ceremony and the license is valid for sixty (60) days following the 24 hour waiting period.

### BOUGHTON PARK PASSES

This past year we issued 517 Boughton Park passes.

You must be a Victor resident or Town of Victor taxpayer to obtain a Boughton Park Pass. Your current registration is required to receive a pass. If you have a question, please call the Town Clerk's office at (585)-742-5080.

### **TAX RECEIVER'S OFFICE 2022 Town/County Tax Payments:**

In person payments by check, cash, or credit card (with applicable transaction fees) can be made at the Town Clerk's office located in the Victor Town Hall, 85 East Main Street, Victor, NY, 14564. Office hours are Monday to Friday 8:30 A.M. - 4:00 P.M. For your convenience, there is a secure drop box located at the rear of the Victor Town Hall. Payments by check may be placed in the drop box.

The Town of Victor offers the option to view and pay your property taxes online.

Town of Victor property owners can view or pay their County & Town taxes online using a credit card or e-check with applicable fees at <https://egov.basgov.com/victor>.

### **ONLINE PAYMENTS CAN ONLY BE MADE FROM JANUARY 1ST TO MARCH 31ST.**

Once on the site, you can choose which tax year you need information for in the drop down box (Choose Collection). Payments made at Ontario County Treasurer's Office will not be reflected on the website.

- If you are looking for Pittsford Central School tax information, it is available online at <https://egov.basgov.com/Victor/>. In the drop down select Pittsford Central Schools. (The Tax Receiver collects Pittsford Central School taxes for approximately 130 properties located within the municipal boundaries of Victor).

- If you are looking

for Village of Victor tax information, it is available online at: <https://egov.basgov.com/VillageofVictor/>.

To search by the property address option, enter the number of the address and then select the correct one if several properties are listed.

To search by the name option, enter just the last name.

County/Town tax bills will be mailed out at the beginning of January. If you have not received your bill by January 12th please call the office at 585-742-5080 or email at: [taxes@town-victor-ny.us](mailto:taxes@town-victor-ny.us).

According to the Real Property Tax Law §922, the failure to mail any statement or the failure of the owner of property to receive the statement does not in any way affect the validity of the taxes or interest prescribed by law.

**By law the town is not allowed to pay the transaction processing fee (collected by the web service provider) therefore it must be paid by the user.**

# Greetings from the Assessor's Office

By now everyone should have received, and hopefully paid, their 2021/22 school tax bill. Many people have taken part in the School Tax Relief (STAR) program. If you are not part of the program, you can still register for next year.

The School Tax Relief (STAR) program offers property tax relief to eligible New York State homeowners. You can receive the STAR credit if you own your home and it's your primary residence.

If you are eligible and enrolled in the STAR program, you'll receive your benefit each year in one of two ways:

**STAR credit check.** If you are registered for the STAR credit, the NYS Tax Department will send you a STAR check in the mail each year. You can use the check to pay your school taxes. To be eligible the combined income of the owners and the owners' spouses is \$500,000 or less. All new property owners since March 2, 2015 are now required to register with the State for the credit check program. If you are a property owner turning 65 you may qualify for additional savings with the Enhanced STAR. When you become eligible for Enhanced STAR, the State will automatically send you

a check for your Enhanced STAR benefit. You only have to register for the STAR credit check program once.

**STAR exemption: a reduction on your school tax bill.** If you've been receiving the STAR exemption prior to 2015, you can continue to receive it for the same primary residence. To remain eligible, the combined income of all owners and owners' spouses must be less than \$250,000. Note: This option is not available on any homes purchased after 2015.

Any Basic STAR exemption recipient who is 65 and older may be eligible for the Enhanced STAR exemption. You only need to apply once. All owners must be at least age 65 as of December 31, 2022, unless the property is jointly owned by a married couple or siblings. This year the maximum adjusted gross income is \$92,000 based on the 2020 tax return. The income limit applies to the combined incomes of all owners (residents and non-residents), and any owner's spouse who resides at the property. The deadline to apply is March 1, 2022.

**Why switch to the STAR credit from the STAR exemption?** If you currently receive your STAR benefit as a reduction on your school tax bill (the

STAR exemption), you may receive a greater benefit if you switch to the STAR credit to receive a check instead. The exemption amounts are capped at \$477 for Basic Star and \$1074 for Enhanced Star. Meanwhile, the value of the STAR credit savings check may increase by as much as 2% each year. There have been STAR credit checks of \$500+ or \$1100+ for the Basic or Enhanced Star credits.

# Planning & Building Department

## SUBDIVISION

Subdivision review is a process that controls how a parcel of land is divided into lots, how those lots are laid out, how the infrastructure (roads, water lines, sewer lines, storm water, drainage) is installed and how open space is situated on the parcel. On September 12, 1977, the Town Board of the Town of Victor, pursuant to provisions of Section 276 and 277 of Article 16 of the Town Law, authorized the Planning Board to review & approve, modify & approve or disapprove subdivision plans.

Subdivision of land is what often drives development and a Planning Board's decision to approve or disapprove a subdivision must be based on substantial evidence in the record. Sometimes residents who oppose a project don't

understand why the Planning Board just can't deny a proposed subdivision project. A denial can only be based on a reason particular to the proposed project, rather than because of generalized community objections. The same is true for a decision by the Zoning Board of Appeals.

When the Planning Board approves an application in spite of neighborhood opposition, the neighbors who took the time to comment at a public hearing may sometimes conclude that the board did not listen to their concerns or that the approval was somehow already predetermined. Planning and Zoning Boards are charged with carefully evaluating each application against a set of criteria that is spelled out in the local zoning ordinance by way of local

laws, subdivision regulations, the State Environmental Quality Review Act and the Town's Comprehensive Plan. Many projects, depending on the location, may also require referral to the County Planning Board for additional review and recommendations. The Boards also take into consideration the public's input in evaluating those criteria.

We encourage Town residents to attend public meetings. Notification of Planning Board and Zoning Board applications are typically mailed to property owners within 500' of a proposed project along with a sign that is posted on the property. Agendas and meeting minutes are also posted on the Town's website along with the recorded meeting via YouTube if you are unable to attend.



## SNOW REMOVAL

With the winter months fast approaching, the town residents need to be aware of plowing crews out doing snow removal operations. The following are some ideas to keep in mind during this period:

1. When snow plow operators are removing snow from the streets, please give them plenty of room to back up and maneuver the plow so that they can safely clear snow from the roads. We appreciate your patience during these snow events.
2. Do not plow snow in the road or across it. If you hire someone to do your plowing, make sure they know that it is illegal to plow snow across a highway. It leaves a hazardous situation for the traveling public.
3. Do not let children play in snowdrifts near the roadway. It is difficult and

almost impossible for plow operators to see them.

4. Keep your house numbers clear of snow in case of emergencies.

## Plowing procedures during snow events:

There are nine main plow routes within the town. During snow events, clearing state and county roadways are the first priority. Plowing then proceeds on the main collector roads, followed by local roads, residential developments, business parks and cul-de-sacs.

If any resident should have an emergency health situation during a snow event and needs to have the road cleared, please contact the Highway Department at 585-742-5094 or call 911.

## SENSIBLE SALTING

As you may have noticed, the Town adopted a “Sensible Salting” program. This was implemented for environmental purposes and to cut down on costs. The streets listed below are areas where the road elevation is minimal and would not require the amount of surface treatment that is necessary on other local roads. The streets affected by this “Sensible Salting” program are Canning Parkway, Canterbury Trail, Falcon’s Point, Fieldcrest Lane, Gypsum Mills, Highland Green (no salt in turn around), Hidden Brook Trail, Kensington Court, Mill Street, Rae Boulevard, Rolling Meadows Lane, Sachem Trail,

Scudder Mills, Song Hill Lane, Springdale Court, Sunray Crest, Trillium Trail, Whispering Hills, Bradhurst Street, Esjay Drive, Saurer Farms, Bramwell Park, Yale Court, Royce Circle, Warters Cove, Fox Hunt Drive, Morgan Circle, Pelham Rise, Hackney Circle and Wildwood Lane.

## PARKING

No parking on Town roadways from November 1st – April 1st, unless otherwise posted.

## MAILBOX REPAIR POLICY

It is the homeowner’s responsibility to remove snow from around their mailbox. This allows mail to be delivered and the opportunity for plow operators to see the mailbox. Unfortunately, mailboxes are damaged yearly by the heavy snow and ice as it is being removed from the roadway. It is a New York State Attorney General ruling that mailboxes are private property placed in the public right-of-way, however mailboxes damaged during snow removal by the town crew will be repaired or replaced by town highway personnel. Replacements will consist of a four-inch pressure treated post and cross arm and a standard black aluminum box. The

town will not replace anything other than a mailbox and post as described. Owners wishing to make their own repairs will not be reimbursed. Thank you in advance for your help in making snow removal safer and easier for all involved.

The Town is not responsible for damage from plowing operations to basketball hoops or any other property placed within the Town right-of-way.

**TRANSFER STATION REFUSE/ RECYCLE DEPARTMENT**

The Town of Victor established the Transfer Station for residents to dispose of garbage and recyclable materials many years ago. This was not intended to be used as a place for residents who own contracting businesses in the Town to dispose of large quantities of construction materials, tree/

yard debris, recyclables or refuse. We do not have the space to accommodate these quantities of materials and it is an added burden to all tax payers when it is used in that capacity. Please respect the rules set into place so that we can retain this great asset for our Victor community and manage the costs to run the facility.

There are other options for disposal of large quantities of construction material, recyclables, yard debris, and refuse. The Transfer Station employees appreciate your understanding and cooperation in adhering to the rules and standards that have been established.

**\*\*NEW PERMIT FEES\*\***  
**(Effective January 1, 2022)**

The Town has kept permit fees the same for the residents over the last two years. Unfortunately, with the yearly increase in tipping fees for construction material and municipal waste, rising fuel rates and increased utility costs we will need to increase the permit fees for 2022 to cover those expenses and keep our Transfer Station operational. We appreciate your patience and understanding with this increase and remind you that this is a decision made by the Town Board not our Transfer Station personnel. We appreciate your respect during this change.

**2022 PERMIT RENEWALS**

Letters will be sent to current permit holders 3-4 weeks before they are due to expire with information on what is needed to renew the transfer station permit. Permits are renewed based on your permit expiration date; **not on date payment is received.**

**RESIDENTIAL AND SENIOR PERMITS:**

Transfer station permits can be purchased at the Highway/Transfer Station Department, 10 | **WWW.VICTORNY.ORG**

60 Rawson Road, Building “B”, mailed or placed in the drop box. Applications can be found on the website [www.victoryny.org](http://www.victoryny.org). You must include a copy of proof of residency (**one of the following:** license, tax bill, closing papers, lease agreement) and copies of your registration(s) with the completed application and a **check made payable to Town of Victor**. Residential transfer station permits are \$130 (2 per residence). Senior permits are \$115 for residents 65 and over (proof required).

**COMMERCIAL PERMITS**

Commercial transfer station permits are \$130 (2 per business). Commercial permits are for **recyclable materials only-plastic, glass, plastic, cardboard, newspaper and clean metal** (we can only accept small manageable loads). Permits can be purchased at the Highway/Transfer Station Department, 60 Rawson Road, Building “B”. Proof that your business is a Village or Town business will be required, along with the registration of the vehicle(s) that will be used in the facility. Permits must be purchased in person at the Transfer Station Office.

**5-PUNCH CARD/LARGE ITEMS AND CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS**

Residents will need to purchase a punch card to dispose of any large items (furniture, rugs, mattresses) or construction type materials (wood, dry wall, shingles, etc.)

and garage or basement clean outs. Proof of Victor residency and registration to vehicle is required. Cost is \$120 for 5 punches. The card **does not expire until all 5 punches are used**. Only one card will be issued per household/per year. **NO REPLACEMENT** will be issued for lost punch cards. **ACCEPTED MATERIALS:  
RECYCLABLES**

*(please sort as follows):*

Do not sort recyclable materials in plastic bags. These are considered contaminated recyclables and thrown in the garbage.

- Commingle - Plastic, tin and glass
- Corrugated cardboard
- Newspapers, boxboard, junk mail and magazines (no plastic bags)
- Batteries – all types EXCEPT CAR/VEHICLE/EQUIPMENT BATTERIES
- Metal – Steel, copper, non-ferrous and ferrous metal, appliances made of metal (except refrigerators)

**TREE AND BRUSH DEBRIS**

Residents must have a Transfer Station Permit in order to dump tree and/or brush debris.

**SORTING AREA**

- Leaves, grasses, weeds, plants and any other greenery left side of designated area (no plastic bags)
- Branches, trees and logs (please cut large wood pieces to under 6') right side of designated area



We recognize that this area is tight to maneuver in, so please be patient and wait for an opening to dump your debris.

**No contractors or landscapers allowed in the facility. All tree and brush debris must be brought in by permit holders only!!**

**ORGANICS**

In an effort to initiate waste diversion, the Town Board has approved and adopted an organics recycling program through Impact Earth. This is done through a bucket exchange and will now be an option as part of the residential Transfer Station Permit. Currently over 160 Transfer Station permit holders take advantage of this program. If you are a Transfer Station permit holder and are interested in being a part of our waste diversion effort, please contact Casey Paige at 585-742-5094 or [cpaige@town-victor-ny.us](mailto:cpaige@town-victor-ny.us).

**TIRES**

There is a **maximum of 4 tires** each permit year (coupons for tire disposal will be issued at time of permit renewal or purchase). There will be **NO REPLACEMENT** coupons issued if they are lost. The tire disposal area is now located **INSIDE** the Transfer Station Building next to recyclable materials.

**LARGE ITEMS,**

**CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS AND GARAGE/BASEMENT CLEANOUTS**

Must purchase a punch card in order to dispose of this type of debris.

**UNACCEPTABLE MATERIALS: ELECTRONICS**

Electronics are not accepted at the transfer station. For more information on electronic recycling go to [ewaste.com](http://ewaste.com) or call 585-924-3840 or check the Ontario County website for upcoming events [ontariocountyrecycles.org](http://ontariocountyrecycles.org).

**HAZARDOUS WASTE (oil based paints, pesticides, gasoline, chemicals, fluorescent bulbs)**

Must be disposed of at hazardous waste disposal events. For more information call 585-526-4420 or go to [ontariocountyrecycles.org](http://ontariocountyrecycles.org).

**ILLEGAL DUMPING**

Anyone dumping any debris at the Transfer Station without the proper permit will be considered illegally dumping and per the Town Code Book, Section 155-5 could face fines and/or imprisonment.

**REMINDERS:**

- All mulch must be loaded by the residents.
- When entering the transfer station, please make sure the only items in your trunk or back of vehicle are your refuse/recycling. Missing items will not be compensated for or replaced!
- Contractors (even if you

are a town resident) are not allowed to dump construction debris or tree and yard debris in the transfer station if it is not from your residential property.

- No garbage cans over 75 pounds.
- Absolutely no dump trucks or trailers allowed in the recycle facility.

**SAFETY**

Please be aware of attendants while unloading and moving through the building. Again, thank you for “thinking safety” while using this facility.

Due to liability and safety concerns, NO LOITERING or going through containers will be allowed at the Transfer Station. Anyone caught doing so, will be asked to leave the facility.

**DO NOT PLACE BROKEN BULBS OR GLASS OF ANY TYPE LOOSE IN YOUR GARBAGE BAGS. PLEASE WRAP IN PAPER AND LET ATTENDANTS KNOW THERE IS BROKEN GLASS IN THE BAG!**

Should you have any questions on where an item should go, please see an attendant. Thank you again for your continued safe use of this facility.

One group enjoying the variety of mushrooms at Boughton Park was the newly formed Victor Farmington Library's Wednesday Walkers. The Wednesday Walkers formed when Community Services Librarian Greta Selin-Love approached Victor Hiking Trails (VHT) to partner and lead walks on local trails and in parks during the summer.

Boughton Park Commissioners. The walkers enjoyed learning the history of the park: the area was originally settled by native people because of the water source, the ponds were formed when the two dams were built, creating reservoirs for the Village of Fairport. The park was formed when the Towns of East and West Bloomfield and Victor purchased the land.

The walks are done at a 'stop and smell the roses' pace, allowing everyone to learn about plants, trees, birds, and nature,

with many taking beautiful photographs. In addition to all the mushrooms, walkers saw lots of black walnuts, pine seedlings planted in the spring, different custom benches along the trail, and one sharp eyed walker also spotted a fossil.



For many in the group, new friendships are forming and the walkers are now going to meet weekly through the fall. If you are a Victor, East or West Bloomfield, resident and would like to visit the park, please obtain a free parking permit from the Victor Town Clerk's Office.



## **PERMIT, EVENT AND BOAT RACK REGULATIONS**

### **Park Use by Permit ONLY**

- Free permits are issued by Town Clerk to residents of the Towns of East Bloomfield, West Bloomfield and Victor.
- You must apply to the Town Clerk in the township where you live
- All permits must be displayed prominently

### **Boughton Park Hang Tag Permit Process - New:**

When applying for a new Boughton Park Hang Tag Permit:

1. You must bring your driver's license, car registration and proof of residency to the Town Clerk's office where you live
2. A new tag will be issued

### **Boughton Park Hang Tag Process - Renewal:**

To renew your expired hang tag permit:

1. You must bring in your expired hang tag to the Town Clerk's Office.
2. There will be a \$5.00 charge if expired permit is not returned at the time of renewal
3. You must bring your driver's license, car registration and proof of residency.
4. A new tag will be issued.

### **EAST BLOOMFIELD DOG CONTROL LAW**

As of November 2014, the Town of East Bloomfield has adopted a Dog Control Law that pertains to all dog owners within the town limits. This includes Boughton Park. All owners must be in complete control of their dog at all times while in Boughton Park, as well as anywhere within the Town

of East Bloomfield. Contact the East Bloomfield Town Clerk at 585-657-6515 for a copy of the Dog Control Law, Local Law #2 of 2014.

### **EVENT POLICY**

The Boughton Park Board of Directors periodically receives requests for organized group events within the Park. It is difficult to predict the impact of these events, i.e., size of the group, needed parking, the number of other visitors in the park, etc. As a result, the following policy applies to all group events in the Park:

Organized town groups (churches, scouts, Bloomfield or Victor School classes, etc.) should contact Member Claudia Walsh by email at: [boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com](mailto:boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com) at least two months in advance, to discuss specific details for any desired Park event.

**For other private groups & organizations, the following rules apply:**

- The maximum size of the group is 25 people.
- The maximum number of cars for the group is limited to 10.
- Either or both parking lots may be used, however the maximum still applies.
- The Stirnie Road picnic pavilion may be used. The reservation system should be used by contacting Member Claudia Walsh by email at: [boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com](mailto:boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com) as early as possible, as this is a limited resource available to all residents.
- No permanent or temporary structures can be brought in or constructed in the Park for any event.
- A representative of the event must make a request & provide documented details to the Boughton Park Board of Directors at least 2 months in advance of the planned event date.
- Depending on the size, the group must pay in advance, the rental fee for any additional porta-johns on site during the event. The Boughton Park Board of Directors will schedule the drop-off & pickup of the unit.
- Only 1 event can be scheduled on any one day in the Park. First requested is first granted.
- The group must identify one responsible individual to act as contact for the Town & Park. This representative will attend the event & be responsible for the event and its use of the Park before, during, and immediately after the event (i.e., including cleanup).

**DONATIONS TO THE PARK ARE ALWAYS WELCOME.**

**All other Park rules and regulations apply, including:**

- All parked cars must have a tag and be within the two designated parking areas.
- No alcohol in the Park.
- Swimming is prohibited anywhere in the Park.
- This is a carry-in carry-out Park. Nothing is to be left in the Park after the event.

**SPECIAL USE PERMITS**

Groups of 25 or more require Special Use Permits. These permits are issued by the Boughton Park Board of Directors. Applications shall be in writing including dates, specific use, and insurance coverage where applicable. Contact Member Claudia Walsh by email at: [boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com](mailto:boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com) for more information.

**BOAT RACK POLICY**

Applications will be accepted at the East Bloomfield Town Hall, beginning the 2nd Monday in March of each year.

**Applications will be accepted on a first come first served basis, with preference going to:**

- Handicapped first
- Seniors Citizens second
- Opened to all if spaces are left
- Permits may be picked up by April 15th
- Permits that are not picked up by April 30 will be given to the next person on the list.
- All boats must be removed by November 15th or they will be moved to the barn at a cost of \$15.00 and charged a daily rent in the amount of \$5.00 per day with a maximum of \$100.00.

- The canoes will be considered abandoned by January 1 and will be sold at auction on April 15 of the following year.

**Canoe/Boat Permit holders are required to use their slips by July 1st or forfeit the permits. Usage will be monitored and if it is observed that the slips are infrequently utilized, the permit may be revoked and the slip assigned to another user.**

# Thirty Years Of Walking The Walk: Victor Hiking Trails

In the fall of 1991, a group of like-minded individuals banded together to form Victor Hiking Trails (VHT). They espoused a vision of a network of scenic, well-maintained trails, readily accessible to the Victor community. Thirty years later, a vibrant VHT, with one foot in the present, and the other striding into the future, continues the work of the founders. Here are some VHT highlights:

**THE FUTURE** - A century ago, someone watched an early automobile attempting to drive over mostly dirt, bumpy roads, and a vision was generated. Paved roads. That person recognized the trends, and envisioned the future. Today, across the country, there has been an increase in walking and biking. Terms such as “walkability” and “connectivity” are sprinkled throughout Master Plans. Victor is no exception. The Victor Parks & Recreation Master Plan establishes the goal of having a trail within a mile of each point in Victor. We dream of someday having a network of multiuse trails enabling Victor residents to travel anywhere within the town by foot or bike. Supervisor Marren and the Victor Town Board recognize the value of a trail system, as well as the vision of a network of trails. In July 2021, the Victor Town Board approved utilizing Victor Hiking Trails as advisors to the Victor Planning Board. This means that the trail experts of the VHT will have input into new Victor developments.

**PARTNERSHIPS** - Visions become a reality when we work together. As mentioned, VHT has partnered with the Town of Victor’s government in order to pursue a vision. Other VHT partnerships include the VCS PTSA and the Victor/Farmington Library. Last winter, we and the PTSA began a series of guided hikes for parents and their kids. More are in the planning stage. The V/F Library and the VHT jointly host a Wednesday hike, along with other projects such as the StoryWalk at Victor Municipal Park. You will find VHT members on most, if not all, of the many community

committees working to improve the lives of all Victor residents. If an organization is interested in partnering with VHT on a hike or a project utilizing the trails, please contact us. We believe in networking trails and people!

**NEW STEPS** - We are proud to say that our total trail mileage in the Town of Victor is nearing seventy (70) miles. In the past few months we added some new trails to our map. These new trails, like most trails, are made possible by community-minded citizens of Victor. These people generously allow their fellow citizens to enjoy a walk and/or a ride with a beautiful view. They are our heroes!


## Farmington - Victor Sewer Department

Started in 2018 (budgeted \$40,000) and continuing in 2022 (budgeting \$150,000) this long term project will address older parts of the system that have water infiltrating into the sewer lines thus reducing the amount of liquids that need to be treated at the Waste Water Treatment Plant located at McMahon road. This year's project should be completed by the end of October.

### GRANT ACTIVITY UPDATE

- The Town was successful in securing \$500,000 in grant funding through the Community Development Grant Program. The Economic Development Department coordinated the application process and will be working with a committee to administer the funds to businesses that apply. We hope to solidify that process in November 2021 and promote the availability of funds to local businesses when that is complete.
- The Victor Street connectivity & Access Plan funded through the UPWP Development Committee

is underway. A kick-off meeting of the committee was held in September and we are working with LaBella as the consultant. Requests for proposals have been issued for the Adams Street Feasibility Study which when completed will determine the feasibility, costs and include some initial designs for the proposed new road. This road would be an extension of Adams Street and run parallel to Route 96 from School Street to Route 251.



We had a busy and productive summer months at Victor Farmington Ambulance as we continue to navigate through the COVID-19 pandemic. We have seen an unprecedented increase in our call volume this year, especially during the summer months. I am happy to say that not only did we keep our staffing number up, but we were able to add a second crew from the hours of 11:00 P.M. to 6:00 A.M. We now have 2 crews available 24 hours a day/7 day a week. This is a testimony to the hard work of my Operational staff and our board of directors.

COVID-19 is still a constant issue for all of us, especially for us here at Victor Farmington Ambulance. We have seen a rise in COVID-19 cases, and we have returned to our previous policy

of wearing masks where social distancing is not possible. We also have temporarily closed our base to visitors, but our loan closet is still open, and we are loaning out equipment to our residents at a brisk pace. If you have any questions about our loan closet, you can call us at (585)924-3959.

School is back in session and Victor Farmington Ambulance is happy to continue our working relationship with the Victor Central School District. Deputy Chief Palmer and I have regular dialogue with the school's health and safety committee. Lieutenant Merkel and the Training Department continue to provide CPR and First Aid classes for our residents and businesses in the Victor and Farmington

area. Lt Merkel and members of the training department recently were featured at the Rochester Red Wings game and were able to demonstrate and teach "hands only" CPR to numerous spectators. It is our hope to have more of these training/teaching scenarios in the near future. The Training Department is also excited to announce that we have begun a program where Victor Farmington will be assisting local businesses in purchasing AEDS and setting up CPR and training programs. Members of the Department are trained for an all-hazards emergency response. Essentially, the core functions of the Department are fire suppression, emergency medical response, hazardous materials response, fire prevention, and education. Members of the Department respond to all major events such as ice storms, snow storms, major electrical outages, floods, and any other emergent needs from homeowners in the community. Members of the Department do much more than just respond to emergencies as well. Other programs offered by the Department include tours, home safe inspections, and fire extinguisher trainings.

What a firefighter does in one fire department may slightly, or drastically, differ from what a firefighter does in another fire department, whether nearby or across the country.

And if you watch TV shows that depict firefighters, it is common to see crews sitting around the kitchen table, joking and having fun, and maybe

even watching TV or sleeping during the daytime.

Rarely do you see firefighters portrayed as doing busy work or productive work, such as actual preplanning exercises – and that does not mean going shopping; it means actually walking through existing occupancies or buildings under construction to learn how they are constructed and analyze how they would mitigate an emergency.

Rarely do you see TV firefighters performing company fire prevention inspections, engaging in fire/rescue training, doing physical fitness training or even just maintaining their fire station, apparatus, tools and equipment.

It would open a lot of people’s eyes, including the eyes of future firefighters, if they realized that firefighters do far more things than just run calls and sit around the kitchen table waiting for the next run. It would certainly prevent the shock of new firefighters who have to run



medical calls or handle public education details or company inspections, or whatever it might be that they didn’t expect.

Before any future firefighter determines this is the career for them, they must realize that they may be called upon on any given shift to do a number of different things, and even possess the necessary knowledge, skills and abilities to accomplish these things at some point during their fire department career.

The Department will formally teach you how to accomplish some of these scenarios. However, for many of these, you will be expected to know from life experience or learn on the job from other firefighters.



# The New Role of a Firefighter-Paramedic

On September 2nd the Department of Health certified the Fishers Fire District as an Advanced Life Support First Response Agency (ALS-FR) in accordance with Article 30 of the Public Health Law. This achievement represents the culmination of a 6-year effort to enhance the medical services offered by the first responders of Fishers.

While this permanent operating certificate is new, advanced care at Fishers has already been underway for 2 years. In 2019, Fishers was issued a temporary operating certificate, a process that allows an agency to initiate advance services in order to demonstrate their fitness to operate a certified EMS program and to justify the public need for the increased level of service.

Across the 2-year period, Fishers completed a comprehensive review and analysis of the EMS program that served as the final application for a certificate of need and permanent operating authority.

The completed application was submitted to the Finger Lakes Regional EMS Council, the body designated by NYS to consider applications for new services. Following a public hearing and a review of the application by a third-party public hearing officer, the 22-member Council voted unanimously to approve the application.

As a paramedic service, crews are now able to deliver the highest level of care available in the out-of-hospital setting. Our paramedics are trained and equipped to perform cardiac monitoring, acquire and interpret 12-lead EKG's, establish venous and intraosseous access, administer 30 different pharmaceuticals, and perform life-saving interventions including needle thoracostomy, cardiac pacing, synchronized cardioversion, manual defibrillation, intubation, and surgical airway.

The staffed primary apparatus at each Fishers fire station is equipped with a

complement of state-of-the-art equipment, including a Lifepak 15 multi-function cardiac monitor and a handheld video laryngoscope for performing difficult airway management procedures.

As well, Fishers is the only agency in the northwestern portion of Ontario County to carry a Cyanokit, the sole antidote for the treatment of cyanide poisoning, a condition often seen in victims with severe smoke inhalation.

While advanced life support is relatively new to Fishers, our paramedics come with a wealth of experience in the field of paramedicine. Our 6 paramedics have an average of 10 years of experience as a paramedic, and 15 years of experience as an EMT.

Our paramedics come with a wide range of experience across urban, suburban, and rural EMS systems.


In busy urban EMS systems, our paramedics have worked with the FDNY EMS unit in the Bronx, NY, Fairfax County Fire Rescue in Virginia, and in the Cities of Salamanca and Rochester, NY.

In suburban systems, our paramedics have worked locally for transport ambulance agencies across the Counties of Ontario, Monroe, and Wayne, including in the Towns of Victor, Farmington, Canandaigua, Pittsford, Brighton, and Irondequoit.

Our paramedics as well come with a unique variety of specialty experiences. This includes experience in critical-care transport environments, civilian rotor and fixed wing medevac, military medicine including helicopter medevac and combat zone medicine, and experience as a SWAT team medic.

Additional advanced EMS credentials amongst our paramedics includes the national registry paramedic, advanced cardiac life support (ACLS), advanced pediatric life support (PALS), critical-care paramedic (CCEMTP), certified flight paramedic (FP-C), neonatal

resuscitation, and pre-hospital trauma life support (PHTLS). Our members seek opportunities on a regular basis to expand their knowledge base and build upon their skill set.

The role of the fire department is to rapidly deliver the first team of medical professionals to the scene of a medical or traumatic emergency. The crew is tasked with performing a detailed medical exam, identifying serious and life-threatening conditions, and initiating the best course of emergency treatment, all before the arrival of the transporting ambulance.

Our experienced and dedicated team of Firefighter-Paramedic's and Firefighter-EMT's are trained, equipped, and ready. At some of your life's worst moments, expect us to be at our best. That is the expectation we hold ourselves to each and every day. And in doing that, we hope to offer our fellow residents the greatest opportunity to survive and recover from a serious medical emergency.

And please remember! Our crews are on-duty 24/7. Stop by the station to take a tour, meet the crew, check out the fire trucks and equipment, or to simply get your blood pressure checked. It would be our pleasure.

# 2022 Fishers Fire District Adopted Budget

The Fishers Fire District Board of Fire Commissioners held a Public Hearing on October 19, 2021, and approved the 2022 Fishers Fire District budget. The 2022 tax rate is \$2.753 per \$1000 of assessed value, which is a decrease of 20.54% compared to the 2021 tax rate. The Board of Fire Commissioners used \$700,000 of Unassigned Fund Balance which was left over from prior budget years in order to offset the 2022 tax rate. The Unassigned Fund Balance represents the surplus of tax dollars due to a variety of factors, such as improvements in District operations, items assigned in prior years budgets that were not done and/or completed at lower-than-expected costs, unspent funds in 2020 due to COVID, grants received on budgeted items, and guidance from the New York State Comptroller’s Office regarding contingency reserve funds and sick leave liability accounting.

The Board agreed to use the Equipment & Apparatus and Land & Building Reserve Funds to pay for several capital projects in 2022. The 5-year plans for these Reserve Funds can be found on the District’s website at [www.fishersfd.org](http://www.fishersfd.org).


The total 2022 operating budget is \$5,325,523, which is a decrease of \$232,365. Several large projects were completed in 2021, which decreased the amount of the

overall costs of operations in 2022. The Board voted to add an additional floating firefighter to cover personnel absences, thereby reducing the amount of anticipated overtime expenditures. The Board also cut the \$500,000 annual funding of the Equipment & Apparatus and Land & Building Reserves from the 2022 budget.

The District has been working very hard to keep tax increases to a minimum. We have enacted a variety of cost-cutting initiatives which include grants, consolidation of positions and services, use of New York State contracts when available for optimum pricing for materials and services, improved procurement processes, and extended contracts. The District has a full-time Chief, 27 full-time career firefighters, 8 volunteer firefighters, 7 Paramedics, and 1 AEMT on staff. We received a full Advanced Life Support/ Paramedic certification in 2021, which enables our firefighters to assist the Victor Farmington Volunteer Ambulance Corps in administering advanced

medical assistance to patients prior to an ambulance arriving on scene.

When you call 911, you expect to get firefighters who arrive to the scene quickly, are fully trained to handle your emergency, can address your situation, and minimize your losses. Your tax dollars fund this staff and operations so that they can be there for you, whenever you need them. Our firehouses are always open to the public – please come by to tour the equipment and facilities, and to meet our firefighters. The 2022 Approved Budget can be found on the Fishers Fire District website at [www.fishersfd.org](http://www.fishersfd.org), or by contacting the Fishers Fire District at 585-924-5955. Chief Chapman is willing to speak with residents regarding any questions that you may have on District operations or on budgeted appropriations.



The library continues to be a busy, active destination for residents throughout the pandemic and we have been fortunate to remain open at maximum hours and fully staffed. We have taken necessary precautions to keep everyone safe, such as mandatory mask wearing and have installed high performing filtration systems on all of our furnaces and air conditioners. It is our goal to keep everyone safe and to provide confidence for patrons every single day.

The library is more than just books. Tutors come to the library with their students, and business people hold meetings here. Community organizations rely on the library for meeting space, our public computers are used every single day, and teens come in to get homework done. Children come for story times and for play and learn activities, and adults come for weekly events such as chair yoga, Tai Chi, board games like Scrabble, and to knit and socialize with others. The library is increasing the different items

that can be borrowed, and we now offer pickleball paddles and hiking poles to borrow so you can get out and get some exercise. Don't forget we offer museum passes, and the Empire Pass which allows you to get in free to our beautiful state parks. For those who think libraries are irrelevant because of the internet, I encourage you to explore our library to see what it has to offer and realize how vital it is to the communities of Victor and Farmington.

We continue to make progress on the new library. We've held open houses on October 21 at the Farmington Town Hall and on November 17 at the Victor Town Hall to allow people to see drawings of what the new library could look like, to ask questions, and to give feedback. We will continue to schedule open houses into 2022 leading up to the budget vote in May of 2022. Your input on the new library is extremely important to us, so if you've missed an open house or have new ideas, we want to hear them. You can also

stop in to the library and say hello and let us know what you think. We want the new library to be a shining star in the community which can offer something for everyone.

Of course, moving forward with a new library hinges on a positive vote in May 2022. You will be seeing an enormous amount of information on the details of the library starting in 2022. In addition to that information, we will have accurate costs on the project and how it affects us all. We continue to work diligently with the architects and engineers to understand numbers, and will be able to provide that information in the first quarter of 2022. We know how important it is to keep costs down, and we are spending an enormous amount of time understanding the dollar amount so we can properly convey that message to the community.

My door is always open and I look forward to hearing from you.

### VILLAGE HALL

Perhaps some of you know but for others this may be news. The office staff including new employee Todd Smith was remarkable the way they carried on with business as usual! Also John Turner and the Department of Public Works were there to help from almost the moment the accident happened and all the way through the recovery process. Special thanks to Craig Coene and Jon McConnell for their immediate assistance helping Pam and Diane and beginning to secure the building. All is back to normal now and we all know things could have been much worse.

## **FLOWERS**

On a brighter note we enjoyed another spring and summer season of beautiful flowers in the Village. The Victor Garden Club once again partnered with the Department of Public Works to make it happen. Congratulations to the Victor Garden Club on their 50th anniversary and celebration at Victor Municipal Park this past summer.

## **CANNABIS**

On March 31st of 2021 the New York State Legislature legalized the use of cannabis in controlled amounts. The State has formed a Cannabis Control Board to regulate use, growth, distribution, and sales of cannabis in New York

State. Local municipalities are left to make difficult decisions regarding certain aspects of the law for their respective communities. We as a Board of Trustees have discussed and debated many issues since the April/May timeframe. On May 17th our Board meeting agenda included a public presentation on the Cannabis law and a proposed dispensary for the sale of Cannabis products at 5 Railroad Street in the South Side Business District of the Village. After that meeting there were several occasions at subsequent Board meetings when we openly discussed the State law, the proposed dispensary and our role as a municipality in regulating sales and/or on site consumption, location and hours of operation through the adoption of local laws. These are the aspects of the State Cannabis law that local municipalities are allowed to regulate. The Cannabis control Board governs most other aspects of the Cannabis law. In September, we scheduled a public hearing for October 4th to gather public input on three local laws regarding sale, on site consumption, and location. After receiving the public comments per the proper protocol of a public hearing, the Board of Trustees voted to adopt 3 local laws to be added to the code of the Village of Victor. These laws are found in 1) New Chapter 59 entitled Cannabis, 2) New Chapter 136 entitled Smoking, and

3) Amendment to Chapter 170 entitled Zoning under Sections 170-13.1 B, 13.2 B, and 170.14 B.

## **DOWNTOWN REVITALIZATION**

Our Revitalization Task Force, headed by Trustee Carol Commisso and assisted by the Victor Local Development Corporation Director, Kathy Rayburn, and consultant Mike Cocquyt of Labella Associates has been very busy preparing a grant application for major funding of downtown initiatives thru the Finger Lakes Regional Economic Development Council of NYS. We anticipate approval to submit the application in summer/fall of 2022. My email address will be listed below if you have questions/comments or wish to discuss the content of this letter or any other matter with me directly. Also the public is always welcome to attend a Village Board meeting and express concerns/comments to the Board of Trustees. We ask that if possible you contact the Clerk's office a week in advance of the meeting you wish to attend in order to be placed on the agenda

To prevent damage to your lawn, please put stakes beside the sidewalk to mark where your yard is.

## PARKING ON VILLAGE STREETS AND PARKING LOTS

Parking your vehicle on Village streets or in Village owned parking lots from the hours of 2:00 A.M. to 6:00 A.M. is prohibited. Keeping the roads and streets clear for plowing, helps everyone in the long run. For this, failure to comply may result in ticketing or towing, at the expense of the owner.

## KEEP YOUR HOUSE NUMBERS AND MAILBOXES CLEAR

It's also a good idea to keep your house numbers clear from snow, in case of emergencies. Many don't

realize just how much snow can obscure even a well-known area for emergency personnel. Along with house numbers, please help us by keeping your mailbox clear from snow. By shoveling round the mailbox, mail delivery is easier and it cuts down on the risk of losing the mailbox to a snowplow.

## DRIVEWAY PLOWING

If you hire someone to plow your driveway, please make certain the snow is not plowed into the road. It's not only dangerous for drivers, it's also illegal.

## VILLAGE SPEED LIMITS

Now is also a good time to remind the Victor residents that the speed limit in ALL VILLAGE subdivisions is 25mph. It is also 25mph on Church Street, Hillcrest Drive, Maple Avenue and East & West Parkway. All other streets and highways in the Village are 30mph.

# Village Brush & Yard Waste Collection

## COLLECTION SCHEDULE

**Beginning the first Monday in April through the third Monday in November (weather permitting)** the Village will provide curbside brush and yard waste collection following a monthly schedule (Listed below). **Please place brush and yard waste at the curb no earlier than 6:00 P.M. the day prior to your scheduled collection day and no later than 7:00 A.M. of your scheduled collection day to insure pickup.** In order to keep on schedule, it is essential

that residents follow these procedures. Any brush which does not meet regulations, or is set out on the wrong date, will not be picked up. If you have any questions, please call the Department of Public Works at 924-2004, or the Village Hall at 924-3311.

The Village of Victor no longer collects yard and garden waste bagged in plastic. Yard and garden waste may be placed in a can or receptacle; filled weight not to exceed 75 pounds. Larger brush and tree limbs should be bundled, with rope

or twine (not wire), in bundles no longer than 4 feet long, or weighing more than 75 pounds. Residents interested in bagging their materials should use large paper leaf bags. These 30-gallon paper bags are available for purchase at most home and garden stores. Do not rake, sweep or place yard waste of any kind on street pavement or gutters as they may clog the drains.


