I am sure that residents who enjoy the **outdoor winter weather** have been a little disappointed these past few months. As this winter has been lighter from a snow accumulation perspective, it is important to recognize both the Highway Department and Parks Department employees for always being ready to assist in clearing our roads and municipal buildings regardless of the amount of snowfall.

For the Town's Highway and Parks staff, it has been an opportunity to get a head start on this year's projects. Both crews have had the time to work on drainage improvements, gutter repairs, tree trimming, and the dog park, to name a few.

NEWSPORTHY ITEMS

The 2024 Ontario County Special Collection Events Schedule is now on the Town's website. The County is offering a number of collection events with multiple dates and locations for each one. The events are as follows: Household Hazardous Waste, Electronic Waste, Tire Collection, Paper Shredding, Mattress Collection, and the Pumpkin Collection. I hope you take advantage of these events.

As a reminder, the Victor Memorial Day Parade will take place on Monday May 27th at 10:30am. For those participating organizations, the line-up starts at 9:45am up at VCS.

The Town's Assessor is not conducting a Townwide Revaluation of Commercial or Residential Property for the 2025 assessment roll. The Town historically has an equalization ratio of 100%. For the 2023 assessment roll, our final equalization rate was at 79%. The equalization rate going forward for the 2024 roll will be 68%. The Assessor will continue to work on the revaluation model, with the intent to possibly conduct a revaluation project for 2026. The Town will continue to communicate this in future newsletter publications and on the Town's website.

In your travels down Route 96 you may have observed the vacated property that was once Wilkins RV. They made the decision to relocate to Seneca County. The Economic Development Department will work with the realtor and the County to attempt to redevelop this parcel. A similar scenario played out at the Auction Direct Car Dealership on the east side of the Town. The Ethan Allen store at Eastview has made the decision to move to Monroe County. They are looking to sub-lease this store, and staff will work with Mall officials to try and fill this location.

VETERANS YOUR VOICE MATTERS: the Veterans Coalition is asking for veterans to complete a survey to assist in collecting

information that will directly impact local services in this region. If you know of a veteran, please direct them to the town's website, <https://www.victor.ny.org/>, for access to this survey.

PUBLIC SAFETY IN OUR COMMUNITY

The Town Highway department recently purchased two portable solar powered radar speed signs, and three more are on order. This is the current inventory that we have: 4 - solar permanent radar signs, 2 - solar development signs permanent, 2 - portable solar radar trailers, and 3 - seasonal portable non-solar speed signs. I want to thank the Town Board for continuing to fund these important purchases. Please note your speed as you pass these signs and slow down if you are exceeding the speed limit.

Following an unfortunate accident involving a motorist and a student walking home from VCS, the Town, in conjunction with the School District, petitioned the State Department of Transportation (DOT) to reduce the speed limit on High Street from Lane Road to the Village line. The Town received a denial response from the NYSDOT. The DOT **does** support the establishment of a **School Speed Zone** on High Street and has started this process on the Town's behalf. We anticipate the need to add four new signs in this area when the final instructions come back from the State. New safety signage and crosswalk

striping has been installed to alert motorists to pedestrian traffic. We are asking our commuters to drive at, or lower than the speed limit in the VCS area. More information when this School Zone is activated will be found on the Town and Village website. One very important piece of what the impact is on a motorist caught speeding in a School Zone - **the fines are increased significantly!**

The County's 911 Center announced another technology advancement for callers who dial 911. The launch of "Prepared Live" in the dispatch center went live on March 4, 2024. This software enables the 911 center to livestream video in real-time. This is a voluntary opportunity, and the consent of the caller is required. If a caller consents, they will receive a livestream link via a text from the dispatcher, enabling them to activate live video upon a click. We had three individuals utilize this in the first week.

With the spring and summer season comes an element we don't want in our community. I'm speaking of people who are interested in one thing only - breaking into our cars or homes. We can protect ourselves against break-ins! Most intruders seek easy targets, and they want to get in quickly, quietly, and unseen! The harder you make it for them, the lower your risk of a break-in. Lock your doors, windows, and secure your sliding glass doors. Close and lock your garage doors, as

this allows easy access into your homes if a side door into your house is not locked. Final reminder, lock up your cars! These individuals will take anything of value, and **most importantly they'll take your garage door opener and come back when no one is home.** Remember that when crime hits home, the results can be devastating. I know you have heard this message from me in many previous articles. It's important enough to repeat.

PREPARED LIVE - LIVESTREAM 911 AVAILABLE IN ONTARIO COUNTY

People in Ontario County can now livestream video during 911 calls.

The software, called Prepared Live, launched on March 4, 2024. It will improve the ability to respond to emergencies effectively.

Callers who opt-in will get a livestream link via text from the dispatcher.

Once they tap on the link, the live video starts.

Why do we need a New Highway Facility?

As a lifelong resident of Victor, I take pride in being your elected highway superintendent and keeping our roads safe for your family and mine. You deserve safe roads and good infrastructure and it's my job to make it happen.

That is why I'm reaching out on a very important issue. Our current highway facility is a serious long-term liability for Victor taxpayers. The structure is long past its useful life, and we need to plan for its eventual replacement.

Presently, we do not have the space to add a single plow truck to our fleet. The facility lacks adequate fire protection and

security and cannot be properly heated or cooled due to both its construction and the significant rot and deterioration of its windows, walls, and doors. This deterioration creates many issues, including mold and humidity which cause serious damage to the wiring of the building and equipment.

Lastly, it does not meet current OSHA standards, which is critical for the health and safety of our employees. This also creates significant long-term insurance risk for taxpayers.

We have made do, patched, fixed, and done everything possible to extend the life of the existing facility. Now it is time to begin the work to actually solving the problem.

We knew this day would

come and have prepared for it. The Town has created a special reserve that they have and will continue to put excess funds into, to help fund a portion of this project.

The current structure was originally built in the 1950s, creating various safety and structural issues which prevent it from being rebuilt in place and necessitating a new location. We are hoping to find suitable land to build a new facility with resident input in the coming years.

WHAT DOES OUR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT DO?

While many know the highway department for their plowing and salting of roads in the winter, their responsibilities far exceed that. **They are also responsible for:**

- Road Construction
- Sign Maintenance and Installation

- Drainage Pipe Installation
- Culverts and Ditching
- Stormwater Ponds
- Guiderails
- Mowing Town Roads
- Maintaining Trees within the Right-Of-Way
- Roadkill Clearing

- Emergency Services for Any Right of Way Issues During Storm Events (Flooding, Downed Trees, Debris in the Road)
- Maintenance on All Equipment (Pickups, 10 wheelers, Excavation Equip, Mowers)

QUICK FACTS:

- We plow 123.84 miles of road
- Own and store 52 total vehicles and equipment
- Have added 16 new lane miles of road in the last ten years
- Victor's population has risen over 384% (an additional 12,000+ residents) since the existing garage was built.

COMMON QUESTIONS:

We will be opening Harlan Fisher Dog Park in the anticipated summer months. You will need a key fob that can be paid for annually at the Town Clerk's Office. Feel free to check out the progress pictures on our website at www.victoryny.org. The Town Pups will be so happy!



We offer a number of services which include Marriage, Dog and Hunting/Fishing licensing, Accessibility parking and Boughton park permits, free Notary services, and One-Day officiant Certification.



If you are a new resident, come on in to see us and pick up your Welcome packet that contains a ton of helpful information about the Town and all it has to offer.



Our office hours are Monday through Friday 8:30 AM to 4:00 PM and for

your convenience there is a locked **DROP BOX** located at the back of the building. We will also accommodate anyone who cannot make it into the office during regular business hours. Please call us to schedule an appointment.



Mail-in voter registration forms are available for anyone who wishes to change their party enrollment, has never been registered to vote, or has moved since his or her last registration. This year is the Presidential election of which we will have early voting days for the Primary (if needed). Times and days can be found on our website.



Town Board meetings are held every 2nd and 4th Monday of each month, with the exception of June, July, August, where there will only be one meeting on the 4th Monday of the month at 7:00 PM and will be open to the public. There is a Public Comment Section on every agenda where residents can speak regarding any subject. The Town Board meeting agenda is available for review on the Town of Victor website at www.victoryny.org.



We do not require an appointment to apply for a marriage license. Couples can just come in with their license (or passport) and original birth certificate and fill out the form we will provide to you. We also offer the One-Day Officiant which can be obtained after the couple has created their profile with us. For that, this individual will need their I.D. and to fill out the form we will provide. The fee is \$25 for this One-Day certificate.



To make sure your fur-babe is up to date with State law requirements, be sure to have him/her registered with the Town along with their current Rabies vax documents. We have an Online Portal for renewals as well that can be accessed on our website.



We offer annual and lifetime Fishing & Hunting licensing. Just bring in your ID and if you are not in the DEC system already, you will also need your proof of residency, Hunter education certification and bowhunting education certificate (for bowhunting privileges).

Greetings from the Assessor's Office

GRIEVANCE DAY - TUESDAY MAY 28, 2024, 4 P.M. - 8 P.M.

Grievance Day is an opportunity for you to present information concerning the value of your property to an impartial community board, the Board of Assessment Review (BAR). This is the official start of the formal assessment complaint procedure and is a requirement for the later filing of a Small Claims Assessment Review or Real Property Tax Law (RPTL) Article Seven petition.

The tentative assessment roll comes out on May 1st and if you are not satisfied with your tentative assessment, you have the right to file a grievance to contest the assessment.

Only the property owner(s) or a designated representative can file the grievance complaint.

To start the process a complaint form must be filled out and submitted to the Assessor's Office. The form, RP-524, can be found in the Assessor's office or online under the Assessment Department on the Town of Victor's website. **All Grievance applications MUST be**

completed and submitted by 8 P.M. on Tuesday May 28, 2024. Any applications received after this time **CANNOT** be reviewed.

Along with your completed application, please provide documentation to support your estimate of the property's assessment value. Examples of documentation include:

- A recent listing of the property showing the asking price, time on the market and any purchase offer made.
- A recent sale of the property (submit copies of the signed purchase contract and closing statement).
- Recent selling prices of similar properties in similar neighborhoods.
- A recent appraisal of the property. If an appraisal is submitted specifically for an assessment challenge, the valuation date of the appraisal must be July 1, 2023.
- Photographs showing any items you wish to have considered.
- Any additional information you feel would establish the property's current

market value.

- **A comparison of similar assessments is not an acceptable method to use as a basis of value.**

Once the completed application is submitted, the BAR will review your information. If you would like to present your case to the BAR, please contact the Assessor's office and we can set up an appointment. All appointments are 15 minutes long and **will** be on May 28th between 4 and 8 P.M. The BAR will only discuss your property's market value or exemption removal but will not discuss taxes.

In NYS, when the Assessor signs the roll, he or she is signing an oath that the assessments are fair and equitable. It is incumbent upon the property owner to provide proof if they feel that the assessment is incorrect. If no proof or evidence is submitted to support the owner's opinion of value, the legal presumption that the assessment is accurate and must be upheld by the Board of Assessment Review.

DID YOU KNOW...

For 2024, *only 6¢* of every property tax dollar is paid to the Town of Victor?

Note: example below based on Victor Town resident in the Victor Fire District



SCHOOL DISTRICT 62¢

COUNTY 27¢ TOWN 6¢ FIRE 5¢

Example: A home valued (\$340,000) in the Town of Victor would pay tax of \$9,724 per year in combined School, County, Town and Victor FD. Out of that total, just 6% (\$605.50) would go to the Town of Victor.

Key Town Services Provided

- Economic Development – providing services to assist with business start-up, expansion, relocation and revitalization efforts.

Victor's Connection to Renowned Rochester Architects

Three architects who were renowned in the Rochester area and designed three of Victor's homes, the proposed Sunday School building at the First Methodist Church and a sign for Valentown Hall are Jay Fay, Otis Walter Dryer and his son, Harwood Brownell Dryer. The Dryers were relatives of the Victor Dryer family after which Dryer Road is named.

Jay Fay was born in St. Catherine, Ontario, Canada in 1856. His family moved to Rochester when he was four years old. Starting at a young age, he apprenticed in the office of architect, John R. Thomas, as a draughtsman, and eventually opened his own office in Rochester in 1883.

In March of 1884 he hired Otis Walter Dryer as a draughtsman. Seven months later, in October of the same year, the firm of Jay Fay & O.W. Dryer was formed and would last until 1912. Dryer was guaranteed at least \$600 annually - about \$22,000 in today's dollars and Dryer was 26 years old.

In 1903 the firm designed the C. L. Simonds residence at 26 Maple Avenue - now the Jarmusz-Cotton Funeral Home and Cremation Services of Rochester. The design is shown in Folder #62 - "Residence for C. L. Simmons (1903), Fay and Dryer, architects (the client name should be listed as Simonds) - as part of the Dryer Architectural Collection, 1886-1989 housed at the Rochester Public Library. This house was designed for the family whose cobblestone general store was located at the corner of Maple Avenue and Main Street. Several changes have been done to 26 Maple Avenue - removal of the front porch and enclosure of the front entrance.

Then in 1907 they designed the Charles Green residence at 1640 Victor-Holcomb Road (Route 444): the large yellow house at "The Apple Farm" - this is the SECOND design shown in Folder #37 - "Residence for Charles Green (1907), Fay &

Dryer, architects." This large, prominent, and very distinctive Colonial Revival house looks to retain all of its original exterior design. The only change between the drawings and the actual house design is regarding the columns on the front porch. The architectural drawings show angled (battered) columns - while the actual columns on the front porch are round/fluted columns with straight (not battered) shafts.

The third home that Fay and Dryer designed in Victor was at 1667 Victor-Holcomb Road - right across the street and south of the Charles Green

residence. It was a design shown in Folder #628 - for George Ketchum and without a date. It is a large Colonial Revival style house.

Otis Walter Dryer was born in Rush, NY in 1858 - grandson of Samuel Dryer II and Mary Bahanan of Dryer Road in Victor; son of Orrin Dryer and Adeline Sophronia Stull. He was educated at the village school and Genesee Wesleyan Seminary in Lima, NY. In 1882, he studied architecture under Stuttgart University architect Eugene C.F. Ernst. In 1883, Dryer began working for Buffalo architect, M.E. Beebe, who designed many court houses and public buildings. During this early period, he worked for a short time in the offices of Warner and Brockett--A.J. Warner and his nephew, Frederick, designed many of Rochester's most prominent public buildings, including St. Bernard's Seminary and the Powers Building. Dryer also worked for the architectural firm, Otis and Crandall. While there, Dryer entered his sketches in a competition to design the First Methodist Episcopal Church of

Leroy. He won the competition, but because of his lack of experience in handling such a large job, he turned his commission over to Otis and Crandall who carried out Dryer's design.

And because his brother, George Herbert Dryer was a Methodist minister and District Superintendent of the Methodist Church during this time, Otis had access to information about where church construction was being considered. This gave the firm a distinct advantage in winning church design commissions. Between 1883 and 1976, more than 75 churches throughout the Genesee region were designed by Fay & Dryer and Dryer. (Otis and Harwood were members of Asbury M. E. Church--now Asbury First United Methodist Church). Perhaps that's why they were one of the architectural firms asked to design the Sunday School building at the First Methodist Church in Victor which was completed in 1926. Interestingly enough, the current building DOES NOT match the drawings shown in folder #238. The design in the folder shows a longer wing with different windows on the front at detailing. In fact, Dryer and Dryer were NOT selected as the architects of this building - the contract was with the architect, Charles E. Lathrop of Rochester.

In 1910, O. W. Dryer opened a firm under his own name and his son--Harwood Brownell Dryer - (1895-1992) began to study architecture in 1914 at Cornell University's College of Architecture and worked as a draughtsman in his father's firm during

the summers, until he graduated in 1918. He was a draughtsman for a short time in 1919 for the firm of Gordon and Kaelber before returning to his father's firm as an architect.

In 1923 his father took him into partnership under the name of O.W. Dryer and H.B. Dryer. The firm's name was later changed to Dryer and Dryer. They specialized in school and church design.

Another interesting design in folder #1166 in 1940 was a request by Sheldon Fisher for a sign for the Valentown Hall. Check out the Valentown Hall site to see if it was actually made!


In 1951, O. W. Dryer retired. H. B. Dryer kept the firm name of Dryer and Dryer until his father died in 1957.

The firm of H. B. Dryer continued to be fully active until Harwood Dryer retired in 1976.

There is no roadside brush pick up within the Town. Brush and yard debris can be dumped, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, 7:00 A.M. – 3:30 P.M., Wednesday, 7:00 AM-8:00 P.M. and Saturday 7:00 A.M. – 1:00 P.M. **In order to dump brush, you must have a Transfer Station permit.**

NYS DOT CAMERAS

If you notice any of these cameras on any Town, County or State roads, they have been placed there by NYS DOT to do traffic counts.

Should you have any questions or concerns, please call the Town Highway office at 585-742-5094 or the NYS DOT, Finger Lakes Region at 585-371-9275.

NYS DOT cameras are being set up by the traffic count contractor. These cameras should have a label with the name “NDS” on them (National Data Services) and look like the picture. There has been a significant increase in the use of these cameras, and you can expect to see them more and more as they are a great alternative to tube setups and have many benefits.



SIGN VANDALISM AND THEFT

Traffic sign vandalism and theft is becoming a problem in the Town. Sign vandalism consists of graffiti, bullet holes, physical distress and removal of street and traffic signs along our Town roads.

RESULTS OF VANDALISM AND THEFT OF SIGNS:

- Increase in accidents – particularly STOP signs
- Emergency vehicles are delayed due to missing street signs
- Motorists are confused
- Cost increases to taxpayers due to repeat sign replacements

HOW TO STOP VANDALISM:

- Talk about the consequences with your kids
- If you find a sign damaged, removed or down contact the Highway Department at 585-742-5094
- If you notice vandalism or theft taking place, contact law enforcement immediately

TRANSFER STATION

The Town of Victor established the Transfer Station for residents to dispose of garbage and recyclable materials many years ago. This is not intended to be used as a place for residents who own contracting businesses and reside in the Town to dispose of large quantities of construction materials, tree/yard debris, recyclables

(we will take commercial businesses recyclables, but only in manageable quantities) or refuse. We do not have the space to accommodate these quantities of materials and it is an added burden to all taxpayers, when it is used in that capacity. Please respect the rules set in place, so that we can retain this great asset for our community and manage the costs to run the facility.

Transfer Station Permits:

Transfer Station/Recycle permits can be purchased at the Highway Department, 60 Rawson Road, Building “B”. Transfer station permits are for disposal of household garbage, recyclables, tree, and brush debris, 4 tires, use of the Swap Shop and the mulch.

Residential transfer station/recycle permits are \$145 (2 per residence). Proof of residency and the registration of the vehicle (s) that will be used in the facility will be required.

Senior transfer station/recycle permits (must be 65 or older – proof is required at time of purchase) are \$130 (2 per residence). Must have proof of residency and the registration of the vehicle (s) that will be used in the facility will be required.

Commercial recycle permits are \$145 (2 per business). Commercial permits are for **recyclable materials only**. Proof that your business is a Village or Town business will be required, along with the registration of the vehicle(s) that will be used in the facility.

Organics Only Permits are \$105 (2 per household) for tree and brush debris and bucket exchange program for food scraps only. Must have proof of residency and registration of the vehicle (s) that will be used in the facility.

Payment in the form of cash, check (payable to the Town of Victor) or credit card (2.15% fee) are accepted.

Permit Renewals:

Permit holders will receive a renewal letter 2-3 weeks prior to expiration of the Transfer Station/Recycle permit. Permits can be renewed by mailing a check (payable to Town of Victor) for \$145 or \$130 (65 or older, proof required) along with any vehicle changes to the Transfer Station Office at 60 Rawson Road, Building B, Victor, NY 14564. Permits can also be renewed in person at the Transfer Station Office or placed in the drop box when the office is closed.

Punch Cards:

A punch card will be required to dump large items (sofa, entertainment centers, mattresses, box springs), construction type material (wood, shingles, rugs, tiles, cabinets, linoleum, old workout equipment, riding lawn mowers, etc.) and miscellaneous material from garage or basement cleanouts. **This will be required for dumping any amount of this type of material.** The cost for the card is \$135 (5 punches) and is valid until all 5 punches are used. **Only one card will be issued per year.** Proof of residency is required at time of purchase.

- 1 punch = 1 large item or 1 truck, car or utility trailer load of debris
- 2 punches = Utility trailer larger than 10' long or a truck/car + utility trailer load of material

Clean metal will be accepted as recyclable

Electronics:

We do not accept electronics at the Transfer Station. Electronics can be recycled through E-waste, 7318 Victor-Mendon Road (Rt. 251), Victor, New York 14564. Drop off hours are Monday – Friday, 8:00 A.M. – 4:00 P.M. For more details or for additional drop-off locations go to www.ewaste.com.

Wildfire Prevention

Every year as we watch the news, we have seen the devastation Wildfires cause across our great nation. We often associate this threat as a western states issue, but that isn't necessarily the case. The east coast and specifically New York State has had its share of Wildfires over the years.

Wildfires, wherever they occur, can be devastating, destroying natural resources, property, and lives. In an effort to reduce damage from wildfires, in 2009 New York State created the Open Burn Ban effective from March 16 – May 14 of every year. <https://dec.ny.gov/environmental-protection/air-quality/open-burning>.

In support of New York State's efforts to reduce wildfires, the Town of Victor has recently adopted a local code requiring an Operating Permit for any Open Burning conducted within the Town of Victor. This includes any fires larger than 3' in diameter.

If you are planning an Open Burning Fire, a Bonfire, or Brush Fire, and the pile will be bigger than 3' in diameter, then please call the Town of Victor Planning & Building Department for a permit. If your fire is only a campfire, smaller than 3' in diameter, then no permit is required, however

you still have to follow all the same fire safety rules.

Open Burning – Larger than 3' - Town of Victor
Open Burning Permit required.

- A recreational fire (3' diameter or smaller) shall be a minimum of 25' from a structure or combustible materials.
- Open Burning fire (Larger than 3' diameter)

shall be a minimum of 50' from a structure or combustible materials.

- Provisions must be available to prevent fire spread for all size fires.
 - Attendant in constant supervision of fire.
 - Firefighting tools shall be on site to be used by attendant if necessary. These may include:
 - Water hose, or supply of water in buckets.
 - Shovel, rake or hoe.
 - Cell phone or other provisions for calling 911 in an emergency.
- If the fire starts to spread beyond your ability to control, evacuate the area and call 911 immediately.
- Never burn trash, refuse, yard waste, leaves, tires, or construction debris.
- Never use flammable or combustible liquids to initiate or accelerate a fire. This is highly dangerous!
- All fires shall be extinguished prior to abandonment or by 10:00pm.
- Sky lanterns are not allowed by the Fire Code of New York State and can be highly dangerous.



Camp Fire – 3' diameter or smaller - No Permit required but all Open burning and recreational fire regulations and safety guidelines must be followed.




Greetings from Boughton Park

You may have noticed if you have been out for a hike at the park these past couple of weeks that 6 trail counters have been installed at various locations. There are 3 located off the Boughton Road lot, 2 off the Stirnie lot and one on the Eagle Trail. The trail counters are important tools for documenting park usage, and critical for future budgeting and funding of park operations. The data is retrieved on-site from each counter, then downloaded onto a computer using special software. The information collected can be analyzed to determine peak trail use days/times, to understand use patterns by mode, and to best learn how to improve the user experience. We will be sharing our results in the next issue of the Victor Voice Newsletter.

With spring around the corner, we will be planting more native trees and shrubs throughout the park. We will be also working with a tree service for the removal of additional dead, and/or hazardous trees, along the trails. Signage or tape closing off trails will be put in place on the days the tree work will be performed. For everyone's safety, please stay off the closed trails.

PERMIT, EVENT AND BOAT RACK REGULATIONS

Park Use by Permit ONLY

- Free permits are issued by Town Clerk to residents of the Towns of East Bloomfield, West Bloomfield and Victor.
- You must apply to the Town Clerk in the township where you live
- All permits must be displayed prominently

Boughton Park Hang Tag Permit Process - New:

When applying for a new Boughton Park Hang Tag Permit:

1. You must bring your driver's license, car registration and proof of residency to the Town Clerk's office where you live
2. A new tag will be issued

Boughton Park Hang Tag Process - Renewal:

To renew your expired hang tag permit:

1. You must bring in your expired hang tag to the Town Clerk's Office.
2. There will be a \$5.00 charge if expired permit is not returned at the time of renewal
3. You must bring your driver's license, car registration and proof of residency.
4. A new tag will be issued.

EAST BLOOMFIELD DOG CONTROL LAW

As of November 2014, the Town of East Bloomfield has adopted a Dog Control Law that pertains to all dog owners within the town limits. This includes Boughton Park. All owners must be in complete control of their dog at all times while in Boughton Park, as well as anywhere within the Town

of East Bloomfield. Contact the East Bloomfield Town Clerk at 585-657-6515 for a copy of the Dog Control Law, Local Law #2 of 2014.

EVENT POLICY

The Boughton Park Board of Directors periodically receives requests for organized group events within the Park. It is difficult to predict the impact of these events, i.e., size of the group, needed parking, the number of other visitors in the park, etc. As a result, the following policy applies to all group events in the Park:

Organized town groups (churches, scouts, Bloomfield or Victor School classes, etc.) should contact Member Claudia Walsh by email at: boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com at least two months in advance, to discuss specific details for any desired Park event.

For other private groups & organizations, the following rules apply:

- The maximum size of the group is 25 people.
- The maximum number of cars for the group is limited to 10.
- Either or both parking lots may be used, however the maximum still applies.
- The Stirnie Road picnic pavilion may be used. The reservation system should be used by contacting Member Claudia Walsh by email at: boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com as early as possible, as this is a limited resource available to all residents.
- No permanent or temporary structures can be brought in or constructed in the Park for any event.
- A representative of the event must make a request & provide documented details to the Boughton Park Board of Directors at least 2 months in advance of the planned event date.
- Depending on the size, the group must pay in advance, the rental fee for any additional porta-johns on site during the event. The Boughton Park Board of Directors will schedule the drop-off & pickup of the unit.
- Only 1 event can be scheduled on any one day in the Park. First requested is first granted.
- The group must identify one responsible individual to act as contact for the Town & Park. This representative will attend the event & be responsible for the event and its use of the Park before, during, and immediately after the event (i.e., including cleanup).

DONATIONS TO THE PARK ARE ALWAYS WELCOME.

All other Park rules and regulations apply, including:

- All parked cars must have a tag and be within the two designated parking areas.
- All fishing is CATCH & RELEASE ONLY
- No alcohol in the Park.
- Swimming is prohibited anywhere in the Park.
- This is a carry-in carry-out Park. Nothing is to be left in the Park after the event.

SPECIAL USE PERMITS

Groups of 25 or more require Special Use Permits. These permits are issued by the Boughton Park Board of Directors. Applications shall be in writing including dates, specific use, and insurance coverage where applicable. Contact Member Claudia Walsh by email at: boughtonparkinfo@gmail.com for more information.

BOAT RACK POLICY

Applications will be accepted at the East Bloomfield Town Hall, beginning the 2nd Monday in March of each year.

Applications will be accepted on a first come first served basis, with preference going to:

- Handicapped first
- Seniors Citizens second
- Opened to all if spaces are left
- Permits may be picked up by April 15th
- Permits that are not picked up by April 30 will be given to the next person on the list.
- All boats must be removed by November 15th or they will be moved to the barn at

a cost of \$15.00 and charged a daily rent in the amount of \$5.00 per day with a maximum of \$100.00.

- The canoes will be considered abandoned by January 1 and will be sold at auction on April 15 of the following year.

Canoe/Boat Permit holders are required to use their slips by July 1st or forfeit the permits. Usage will be monitored and if it is observed that the slips are infrequently utilized, the permit may be revoked and the slip assigned to another user.



Conservation Board

The Town of Victor Conservation Board was established in 1970 and strives to protect and promote the environmental resources of the Town of Victor. The Conservation Board is an Advisory Board, making recommendations to the Town's Planning and Zoning Boards regarding natural resources that exist on land in the Town of Victor. Board members are charged by the State of New York to assist Town officials "in the development of sound open area planning and assure preservation of natural and scenic resources." The Board works to protect environmentally sensitive areas in the Town, striving to strike a balance between Victor's small-town character and future growth and development.

The Natural Resources Inventory (NRI) is one of several data sources that the Conservation Board uses to review development applications and prepare comments, and to complete environmental assessment Forms. The NRI is located on the Town of Victor Conservation Board website <http://www.victorny.org/>. Follow the Town Government link, through Boards and Committees, to the Conservation Board Document site.

Many of the natural resources that exist in the Town were left behind by receding glaciers about 18 thousand years ago! The next time you are driving (or better yet, hiking) through Victor, look for these features that make Victor unique. Page 15 of the NRI contains a shaded relief map of Victor indicating where these features are evident in the Town.

DRUMLIN

Drumlins are glacial landforms characterized as low, smoothly-rounded elongated hills sculpted beneath the ice of a flowing glacier. The classic Drumlin shape is blunt at one end and tapered at the other. The blunt end faces the direction from where the glacier originated while the gentler slopes indicate the direction the glacier was moving. Boughton Hill is one example of a large drumlin.

ESKER

Eskers are ridges of sand and gravel created by glacial retreat or stagnation. Eskers can be 100 or more feet high and hundreds of miles in length!

KAME

Kames are hills or small mounds of glacial sediments composed of sand and gravel. The largest Kame hills in Western New York are in the southwestern part of the Town of Victor, extending into East and West Bloomfield as well as the Southwest corner of Mendon. At an elevation of over 1100 feet, the Hopper Hills area is a Kame and is also the highest point in the Town of Victor.

MORaine

Moraines consist of unsorted rock material transported by a glacier and mark the outermost extent of a glacier's progression. As the last ice sheet retreated from our area, it created two important ridges (Moraines) along its track. Look for the larger of these Moraines in the Southwest portion of the Town between Dryer Road and County Road 41. The mowed area at the top of this Moraine is Fort Hill. A smaller,

discontinuous Moraine can be found in the area just north of the NYS Thruway.

KETTLE (HOLES)

Kettles are bowl-shaped features found only in glacial deposit areas. Kettles are formed when blocks of ice break away from the glacier and become buried. When the block eventually melted, the cover slumped in, creating the Kettle. Kettles can fill with groundwater creating a kettle lake. Crossman's Pond on Lower Fishers Road is a kettle lake estimated to be 60 feet deep.

VICTOR DOG PARK UPDATE

A dog park at Harlan Fisher Park was identified as a priority project in the 2019 Parks and Recreation Master Plan update. Public input was gathered via numerous public outreach sessions. Bayer Landscape Architecture of Honeoye Falls was hired as lead consultant to assist our Parks and Recreation Department and the Parks and Recreation Citizens' Advisory Committee in developing this project. Keep an eye out for our Victor Dog Park webpage which will have rules, usage fees, and dog park permit application (FOB access).

landscaping, seating for people and numerous other features and amenities. Payment of an annual fee of \$30 is required. Major funding for the dog park has come from the Parks and Recreation Trust Fund. The department has been able to achieve significant savings by having its own staff complete several phases of the park's construction. The Victor Tree Board will be holding its annual Arbor Day Event at Harlan Fisher at 10:00 A.M. on April 20th. Tree Board members, Parks and Recreation and CAC members along with other community volunteers will be planting the trees and shrubbery that were called out in the dog park's design plan. Please consider participating in this event!

Construction of the dog park began in April 2023 and has been going full tilt ever since and we are pleased to announce the park's Grand Opening is scheduled for June 29th from 10:00 A.M. through Noon! All members of the community - even those without dogs - are invited to see the dog park, meet many of the people who have brought this wonderful asset to our community, and participate in the day's activities. 

FAÇADE PROGRAM

The Victor LDC and the Village Urban Renewal will be launching the 2024 Village Façade Improvement program in March. VLDC Director Joe Corsi has taken the lead on this initiative again this year with input from committee members, Village Trustee Carol Commisso, VLDC VP Alyssa Serinis, treasurer Brett Owen, and me. The Village will be sending out a flyer announcing the 2024 program to eligible property/businesses that references due dates and project eligibility requirements. The two agencies provide funding for the program each year and the committee has developed a scoring rubric to apply to the applications that are received.

The Façade Improvement program was started in 2007 and was funded by the VLDC and Urban renewal as a matching grant program. We are pleased to report that from 2007 through 2019 we funded – 74 façade projects totaling \$104,000 in grant funding and \$360,000 in overall dollars invested by building/business owners on these projects. In 2020 we used the funds to offer grants to businesses that needed to cover COVID related expenses and not specific façade projects. When the program was reintroduced in 2023, we funded 7 projects in the amount of \$23,876 in grant funds.

WHO ARE THE FACES OF THE VICTOR LOCAL DEVELOPMENT BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S?

The Victor LDC was started in 1999 as a tool/resource for Village revitalization. While revitalization remains a focus of the agency, we have been able to extend our reach to encompass Town businesses that are in need of similar support through low interest loans and relocation assistance. These initiatives are not accomplished without the support and guidance of the VLDC board of directors.

I am very lucky to be working with this group of talented and dedicated board members. At

It's hard to believe we are already into March of 2024. 2023 was a record-breaking year for us at Victor Farmington Ambulance and we cannot wait to continue that success into this new year. In 2022, We surpassed 3000 calls for the first time in the 52-year history of our agency and we anticipated a similar number of calls for 2023. 2023 turned out to be another record-breaking year as we received a now-record 3,067 calls for service. To put into perspective the amount of growth for not only the agency itself, but also for the communities we cover, 10 years ago we responded to 2,293 calls for service. We have already responded to over 470 calls for service in 2024, and we anticipate another record-breaking year for 2024. As always, our staff is ready and able to provide our residents with the best patient care available.

2023 was a year filled with celebrating our past accomplishments, continuing to strengthen our mission statement in the present, and looking towards the future of our agency. I had mentioned in a previous newsletter that we were finally able to commemorate our 50th anniversary after COVID-19 delayed our official celebrations. Victor Farmington Ambulance officially went into service on July 2nd, 1970, and on October 23rd, 2023, we received official state proclamations from Governor Hochul and the state legislature. We were honored to be able to celebrate this accomplishment with State Senator Helming, Assemblywoman Byrnes, and our Board of Directors. It took many years of dedication and hard work by countless people to get where we are today, and we are forever grateful for their service to our community.

We are continually striving to maintain and improve our response to and relationships with our community and our residents. We have been offering numerous in-house training classes to our staff and leadership and hosting many CPR and first aid classes. Welcome to the vibrant spring season, where nature awakens, and so do our spirits! As we bid farewell to 2023, let's celebrate some remarkable achievements of our dedicated Fishers Fire District firefighters.

In the face of emergencies, our response time was exceptional, averaging 48 seconds, surpassing the national standard of 80 seconds for fire calls. With over 1200 calls attended to; our firefighters even managed 280 simultaneous requests for service.

Behind these impressive numbers lies a dedication to continuous improvement. Through training, totaling over 7800 hours, our firefighters honed their skills and expertise, ensuring they are always prepared to face any challenge that comes their way. Collaboration was essential, as we conducted numerous training sessions with our mutual aid partners, fostering a strong and resilient community network.

But our commitment extends beyond emergency response. Engaging with our community is at the heart of what we do. Through active participation in over 100 community events, we spread awareness and educate and empower individuals to prioritize safety, making our

community a safer place for all.

As we embrace the warmer weather and budding landscapes, we should refresh our awareness of fire safety. Here are some essential tips to keep you and your loved ones safe this spring:

- 1. Outdoor Grilling Safety:** As the barbecue season kicks off, remember to place your grill well away from your home and any flammable materials. Keep children and pets at a safe distance, and never leave the grill unattended. After use, ensure the grill is cooled before storing it.
- 2. Electrical Safety:** Inspect outdoor electrical outlets and cords for any signs of damage from winter weather. Ensure that extension cords and power strips used for outdoor activities are rated for outdoor use and are in good condition.
- 3. Smoke Alarms and Carbon Monoxide Detectors:** Test your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors to ensure they function correctly. Replace batteries if needed and consider installing new devices if yours are outdated.





Letter from the Village Mayor

Hello to all,

By the time this newsletter reaches you, spring will be upon us. The mild winter was a break for many of us but not for winter outdoor enthusiasts!

I would like to start this newsletter with some budget highlights from the Village 2024-2025 budget. Keep in mind that this coming fiscal year runs from June 1, 2024 through May 31, 2025. The time frame for fiscal years is governed by NYS Village Law section 5-510. We completed our budget workshops, open to the public on Jan 29th and February 12th of 2024. The current taxable assessment declined over last year's number. Some of that was due to the fact that the Town of Victor purchased 11 Framark Drive in the Village and a portion of that property received a tax-exempt status. Also,

at this time properties in the Village and Town of Victor are assessed at 77% of value due to the Town's diligence in not allowing assessments to be increased during the pandemic years. I would anticipate a return to higher value assessments in the near future. The 2% mandated NYS tax cap for municipalities would have allowed us to increase from our current \$3.95/1,000 of assessed value to \$4.07/1,000 of assessed value. We were able to balance our budget and still stay under the 2% cap by proposing a rate of \$4.05/1,000 of assessed value. The following illustrates anticipated expenditures.

Many thanks to Diane White our Treasurer, Pam Hogenes our Clerk and to my colleagues on the Village Board of Trustees for your work on this budget.

DOWNTOWN REVITALIZATION:

With assistance from Victor Local Development Corp and LaBella Associates the Village has received a \$335,000 NY Main St Grant to assist business and Building owners with

improvements in the Center Business District.

Additionally, there is a ‘Reimagine Victor’ ongoing cooperative effort to establish common goals and vision involving Village Government and private enterprise in the enhancement of our Village Center.

EMPLOYEES

Due to retirements, we have hired 3 new DPW employees. Welcome aboard to: Derian Woodard, Shane Crandall and Griffin Olsen. Additionally, we hired a new Code Enforcement Officer. Welcome aboard to: Joseph Georgia. Best wishes to our retirees and to Todd Smith, our former Code Enforcement Officer, who took a job with a former employer.

VILLAGE/TOWN/VCSD

We are working cooperatively with the Town and School District and NYS DOT to establish a School Zone on High St in both the Town and Village sections near the school entrances. We hope to implement the project as soon as all approvals are received and signage etc. is purchased and installed. Please take the extra time and effort to abide by the traffic laws regarding school zones. This is for the safety of all drivers and of our children! Also Please remember to obey the law prohibiting passing

a stopped school bus with flashers and STOP signs displayed.

EVENTS

We are fortunate to live in a community where people and organizations come together to provide events and leisure activities that add to the quality of life for all ages. I hope you will keep in mind and on your calendars the following events for this year:

Spring is here and soon it will be pool season. Just a reminder that any pool that can hold 24" of water at any depth must have an enclosure around the pool. This applies to most portable inflatable pools bought at the big box stores. Any fixed or portable pool with 24" or more of water must get a permit from the Village Code Enforcement Officer. All pools shall have a pool alarm as well. Please use caution around pools with regards to children. Every young child is curious about water so please keep a watch on them.

Spring and summer also leads to grass cutting season, just another reminder that the village and state codes says grass must

be no longer than 10" high.

Summer is building season! Please call or email the village and inquire if a building permit is required. Some of the things that require permits are any accessory buildings, decks, roofs, fences, greenhouse's, solar panels, electric car hookups, and any conversion of non-habitable space to living space i.e., basements. If you're not doing the work yourself, ensure the contractor has the appropriate insurance coverage.

Don't forget to check the batteries and the expiration date on your carbon monoxide (CO) and smoke detectors.

Village Brush & Yard Waste Collection

COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Beginning the first Monday in April through the third Monday in November (weather permitting) the Village will provide curbside brush and yard waste collection following a monthly schedule (Listed below). **Please place brush and yard waste at the curb no earlier than 6:00 P.M. the day prior to your scheduled collection day and no later than 7:00 A.M. of your scheduled collection day to insure pickup.** In order to keep on schedule, it is essential

that residents follow these procedures. Any brush which does not meet regulations, or is set out on the wrong date, will not be picked up. If you have any questions, please call the Department of Public Works at (585) 924-2004, or the Village Hall at (585) 924-3311.

The Village of Victor no longer collects yard and garden waste bagged in plastic. Yard and garden waste may be placed in a can or receptacle; filled weight not to exceed 75 pounds. Larger brush and tree limbs should be bundled, with

rope or twine (not wire), in bundles no longer than 4 feet long, or weighing more than 75 pounds. Residents interested in bagging their materials should use large paper leaf bags. These 30-gallon paper bags are available for purchase at most home and garden stores. Do not rake, sweep or place yard waste of any kind on street pavement or gutters as they may clog the drains.


